Participants Short Biographies

Professor Chris Wainwright is Pro Vice-Chancellor of University of the Arts London and Head of Camberwell, Chelsea and Wimbledon Colleges of Arts. He is a member of The Tate Britain Council, Past President of the European League of Institutes of the Arts and currently Chair of the Board of Trustees of Cape Farewell, an artist run organisation that promotes a cultural response to climate change. He has recently co-curated a major international touring exhibition for Cape Farewell called U-n-f-o-l-d that profiles the work of 23 international renowned artists addressing issues of climate change. As an artist and curator, his recent exhibitions include *A Catalogue of Errors* at the Diawa Foundation, London; *Troubled Waters* at The Kuandu Museum of Fine Arts, Taipei; *Futureland Now* at the Laing Art Gallery, Newcastle; *Between Time and Space*, Heijo Palace, Nara, Japan; *The Moons of Higashiyama*, Kodai-ji temple, Kyoto, Japan; *Between Land and Sea* at Box 38 Ostende, *Belgium and Trauma* at the Culturcentrum, Brugge in Belgium.

Chris Wainwright's work is held in many major collections in Europe and the United States.

Dr Malcolm Quinn is Associate Dean of Research and Director of Graduate School, UAL. He is Course Director for CCW MRes Arts Practice, and is an experienced PhD supervisor. He has written extensively on art and design research, using a psychoanalytic approach to the analysis of art and design language and pedagogy. He is a contributor to The Routledge Companion to Research in the Arts (2010). His most recent book *Utilitarianism and the Art School in 19th-century Britain* (Pickering and Chatto, 2012), examined the historical question of how the publicly funded art school emerged from a utilitarian critique of the academy and the philosophical question of the relation between utility and taste.

Neil Cummings is a professor at Chelsea College of Art and Design, a member of Critical Practice; and on the editorial board of *Documents on Contemporary Arts*. He has worked with museums, banks, galleries, archives, auction houses, enthusiasts, places of education and department stores in London, New York, Geneva, Cairo and Warsaw. He has explored the entanglements of art and capital in 19 Century Manchester, documented lost property recovered by London Transport in a single day, constructed possible futures and impersonated a famous art dealer.

Critical Practice is a cluster of individual artists, researchers, academics and others, supported by Chelsea College of Art & Design, London. Through its aims it intends to support critical practice within art, the field of culture and organization.
